
Our staff, Roy, Chip, and Ricky, came to the rescue on many occasions:

Conductive Education Center of Orlando

The Conductive Education Center of Orlando (CECO) was founded in 2001 by a family in Winter Park, Florida, motivated by their son Joseph's journey with cerebral palsy. A six-week pilot program with five children was held utilizing the learning method of Conductive Education. As the weeks progressed, parents saw dramatic changes in their children with neurological motor disabilities to move and progress beyond the expectations of doctors, producing outcomes that exceeded what was believed possible.

Conductive Education is learning method, originally theorized in Hungary, for individuals with neurological motor disabilities, like but not limited to cerebral palsy, which integrates an intensive and motivating approach to the development of gross and fine motor skills, mobility and balance, flexibility and motion, social skills, communication and speech - allowing individuals to maximize their physical independence and strength.

Twenty-three years later, CECO is the largest Conductive Education Center in the United States!

The Orlando County Regional History Center

The Orange County Regional History Center, housed in a historic courthouse in the heart of downtown Orlando, offers four floors of exhibits exploring 12,000 years of Central Florida's rich heritage. A Smithsonian affiliate, the museum also offers visiting exhibitions and a wide range of programs for families, children, and adults. Our mission is to serve as the gateway for community engagement, education, and inspiration by preserving and sharing Central Florida's continually unfolding story.

Welbourne Nursery & Preschool

Welbourne Nursery & Preschool is approaching its 100-year anniversary! Welbourne began its service in 1927 to assist Winter Park's Westside community by providing a high-quality childcare and preschool education program. Over the years, Welbourne acquired its real estate, built its five individual, age-appropriate classrooms and bathrooms (*infants thru four-years old with capacity for 64 children*), extended its hours to 7:00AM thru 6:00PM as women began to take jobs, opened a cafeteria and began serving 3-meals per day (*64 children x 5 days = 320 meals per week*), added basic health/hearing/dental/counseling care, established an academic relationship with the Rollins' Early Childhood program – and has evolved into an A+ school, aiming to graduate its children to kindergarten with social confidence and academic competence!

Thursday November 14, 2PM – Eclectic Floral Arrangement

We are very fortunate to present Lyndsey Boekenkamp, a floral designer who teaches amateurs, like us, how to make floral arrangements look professional.

We will all go home with our own arrangement. It is so much fun to see all the different designs! Even if you do not wish to participate, watching this process is so interesting and surprisingly easy!

For participants - it would be helpful for everyone to bring:

- Any cuts from their own gardens (foliage, flowers etc) which they might like to incorporate
- I would also ask that guests plan to bring a medium size vase (no bigger than a 32 oz mason jar). I will have a few extras onsite for anyone who forgets.
- Please have all participants bring their own snips/scissors. I will NOT be providing these.

MEET: Lyndsey Boekenkamp. She is a flower farmer and floral designer living and working in Orlando, FL. She grew up in her mother's garden and has loved growing gardens and working with flowers ever since. She feels strongly that locally grown American flowers have an important role in the organic farming conversation and are the key to the most beautiful design work. As a result, Lyndsey is passionate about providing organic flowers, sustainable design services and educational opportunities in her community.

Lyndsey has more than a decade of farming and floral design experience and earned her certificate in horticulture from the Brooklyn Botanic Garden. She is a graduate of the Floret Workshop and proud member of the Association of Specialty Cut Flower Growers.



Beyond the flowers, Lyndsey has a Master of Arts degree from New York University in Arts Administration and works at a major non-profit cancer center raising funds for cancer research,

her other passion. She lives with her husband Scotty and yellow lab Mighty in College Park, Orlando.
